The Lord's Prayer

Reading: Acts 4. 1-12

The priests and the captain of the temple guard and the Sadducees came up to Peter and John while they were speaking to the people. They were greatly disturbed because the apostles were teaching the people, proclaiming in Jesus the resurrection of the dead. They seized Peter and John and, because it was evening, they put them in jail until the next day. But many who heard the message believed; so the number of men who believed grew to about five thousand.

The next day the rulers, the elders and the teachers of the law met in Jerusalem. Annas the high priest was there, and so were Caiaphas, John, Alexander and others of the high priest's family. They had Peter and John brought before them and began to question them: "By what power or what name did you do this?"

Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said to them: "Rulers and elders of the people! If we are being called to account today for an act of kindness shown to a man who was lame and are being asked how he was healed, then know this, you and all the people of Israel: It is by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified but whom God raised from the dead, that this man stands before you healed. Jesus is "the stone you builders rejected, which has become the cornerstone.'

Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to mankind by which we must be saved."

- 1] The head that once was crowned with thorns is crowned with glory now; a royal diadem adorns the mighty Victor's brow.

Reflection

For some reason the lectionary reading from Acts starts at verse 5, but I have included the preceding four verses to better give the context, and do read the previous chapter as well if you want the full story. Peter and John had, in the name of Christ, healed an un-named lame man attracting yet more attention to the newly emerging faith and giving rise to more believers. The concerns and fears that had led the authorities to condemn and crucify our Lord now led to persecution of the leaders of this troubling new faith. Peter and John were imprisoned overnight and called to account for their actions the following day, which Peter did in no uncertain terms — no denying of his Lord this time, but an uncompromising declaration of his belief in the power of the Risen Christ.

We are no longer part of a newly emergent faith, rather we have two thousand years of history to reflect on, centuries of Christian worship and witness with stories that can uplift us yes. But there are other stories too of how the church's witness has all too often been marred by power games, corruption and abuse. Those early Christians would have been shocked and saddened if they had known how in time the actions of some church leaders and so-called Christian political leaders directed against their opponents came to mirror the treatment meted out to those early disciples by the religious and political authorities. Churches have played their part in persecution and intolerance down through the centuries and sometimes still do, so that when we are confronted by criticism of our faith position today, humility is called for.

Yes, like Peter and John, we need to proclaim the Risen Christ, but we need to remember that whereas in their time, this was a new faith, in our day people carry a great deal of baggage. It may be what they have heard about the history of Christendom, such as Catholics persecuting Protestants and vice-versa, or what they read in the papers about contemporary intolerance in some churches, or even what they have experienced in their own lives with people failing to live up to their professed Christian believes.

So we have to find appropriate ways to proclaim the faith, but there is one constant with what Peter and John proclaimed – we also witness to the Risen Christ through acts of loving-kindness alongside preaching the good news. Peter and John landed up in trouble as much for the healing of the lame man as for their preaching. We are called to demonstrate the good news in our lives and actions, and those actions of love may still unsettle and disturb those with wealth and power.

O ALMIGHTY God, who alone canst order the unruly wills and affections of sinful men; Grant unto thy people, that they may love the thing which thou commandest, and desire that which thou dost promise; that so, among the sundry and manifold changes of the world, our hearts may surely there be fixed, where true joys are to be found; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen
