## **Celebrations at Boasley**



Boasley has celebrated ten years of Soup and Sweet lunches, it has become a real community hub over that time. When you think about the location of Boasley Chapel and the fact that it is not in a village, it is amazing how many people are reached through this ministry. The question of "Who makes up the community" is like the question asked of Jesus, "Who is my neighbour?" The answer of course, is everyone.



Today there are people who have been coming along for all those ten years plus others who are on their first visit. There is a warm welcoming atmosphere as the hall fills up. Table service is efficient, provided by volunteers from the Chapel as well as two pupils from the school opposite. Everyone is enjoying themselves. The pupils' professionalism

was impressive, prompting the thought that if they wanted to work in the hospitality sector in the future, this was a really good experience for them.

"It's like a party, you meet people and make friends. I've been supporting it for years, it's always a joy," says Winifred from Northlew. Another lady on her second visit said, "I came back and immediately someone waved across the room welcoming me."

Diana Sizmur (who makes a gorgeous pumpkin soup!) is always interested in how people find their way to the Soup & Sweet. "Some come through friends and relatives, someone came through seeing a notice at the bus shelter. People come from Holsworthy, Okehampton and all around. It's wonderful."

There is a choice of six soups "We had nine at

one stage, but it was a bit much!" laughs Diana, and lots of sweets plus tea or coffee. Boasley is blessed with several amazing cooks who give their time and talent in the service of others. The Chapel is alive with the buzz of conversation, friendships being created and affirmed, and the goodness of God being demonstrated through love and hospitality. It's simple but powerful stuff, and for a donation of just £5.00, incredibly good value.

## **Northlew**

Every Saturday there is a coffee morning from 10.00 - 12.00 at Northlew Methodist Chapel Hall which includes a cake sale, but the first Saturday of the month also includes an indoor market. This has been going for less than a year and has proven to be a great success.

There are stalls with all sorts of produce, eggs, preserves, haberdashery and even an Avon stall to name a few. The atmosphere is relaxed and welcoming with a long table in the centre and stalls around the edge. Ros, who has the haberdashery stall, was one



of the instigators of the market, a newcomer to the area from Cornwall, she loves Northlew and has quickly become involved in the community. "What is lovely, is that people from all backgrounds come here. For some, it's the only time they venture out to have a social time with others. We easily get over fifty people, there is seating in the Chapel for people to take their refreshments if it's too crowded in the hall. I love it."

In the summer there is a community table so people can bring excess produce from their gardens to share with others.

Outside the back of the Chapel is the 50/50 shop, a large wooden shed which is an Aladdin's cave of treasures. One could easily get lost in there for a while, there is something for everyone.



#### HERITAGE PROJECT

The idea is to give the visitor of any age a wonderful interactive experience that will leave them with a sense of the Chapel's place in the community from its origins to the present day.

There will also be concerts given by Jim Causley in each of the villages focussed upon. The Chapels are: Northlew, Winkleigh, Exbourne, Chilla, Boasley and Bridestowe.

Now we are in the planning stage and appealing for any photos, stories, information, items of interest that relate to the history of these chapels. Please contact Vicki if you

think you can help. Rachel Short, a local historian, has already visited some people and places collecting oral histories. The more, the merrier – and your memories may be far more interesting than you think!

**Exbourne History Group** has a meeting on 21<sup>st</sup> January 2025 at 7.30pm in the Village Hall with Dr Janet Few giving a talk, "Uproar and Disorder! – the impact of Bible Christians on parishes in North Devon." It promises to be a real treat for local history buffs or anyone who looks at the inscription "Bible Christian" on their chapel and wonders, "So who were they, then?" Non group members are welcome, the cost to attend is just £3.00 and there are refreshments afterwards.

## **History of the Christmas Carol**

Like many traditions, carols weren't originally just for Christmas. The word "carol" originally meant to dance or indicated the song danced to. The first Christmas carol came around AD 129, just 30 years after the death of the apostle John (also known as John the Evangelist). The bishop of Rome at the time, Telesphorus, decreed that "In the Holy Night of the Nativity of our Lord and Saviour, all shall solemnly sing the 'Angel's Hymn.'" The lyrics, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favour rests," come from Luke 2:14.

The earliest carols were written and sung in Latin, making it difficult for many to understand them and, therefore, less popular. However, in 1223, when St. Francis of Assisi began his Nativity plays in Italy, songs and canticles sung in the language of the people watching told the story of Jesus's birth. This helped the new carols spread throughout Europe.

Not everybody thought well of carols. Oliver Cromwell outlawed the public singing of carols in 1644. He banned Christmas celebrations, too. Most continued singing carols in secret, so these songs survived. In fact, there are huge numbers of carols from the fifteenth century that have survived, making it the best-preserved aspect of English medieval music. In 1660, the restoration of the British monarchy abolished all legislation enacted from 1642 to 1660, so Christmas was once again celebrated with feasts, festivities, and carols.

The famous carol that we love to sing, "Hark the herald angels sing", written by Charles Wesley didn't start out as we know it now. The original first two lines were "Hark, how all the welkin rings, glorious the King of kings." Even in the early 18<sup>th</sup> century, 'welkin' was an old-fashioned word for heaven or sky. The preacher George Whitefield altered the opening lines in 1754 that have remained ever since. The tune we sing today was not the original either, the composer Felix Mendelssohn wrote it in 1840.

Hopefully you will get to sing your favourites this year, but as Christmas carols are still being written, it's good to learn some new ones too.
