Isaiah 11: Verses 1 - 10 The Peaceful Kingdom

A shoot shall come out from the stock of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots. The spirit of the Lord shall rest on him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord. His delight shall be in the fear of the Lord. He shall not judge by what his eyes see, or decide by what his ears hear; but with righteousness he shall judge the poor, and decide with equity for the meek of the earth; he shall strike the earth with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips he shall kill the wicked.

Righteousness shall be the belt around his waist, and faithfulness the belt around his loins.

The wolf shall live with the lamb, the leopard shall lie down with the kid,

the calf and the lion and the fatling together, and a little child shall lead them.

The cow and the bear shall graze, their young shall lie down together;

and the lion shall eat straw like the ox. The nursing child shall play over the hole of the asp, and the weaned child shall put its hand on the adder's den. They will not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain; for the earth will be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea. Reflection

We see in this early prophesy from the prophet Isaiah, that God's Kingdom is represented with meekness and majesty. The majesty of a lion, our king of the jungle gently living alongside creatures that we know are usually its prey. In this vision of The Kingdom, we learn that everything is different there, even the ways upon which judgement is based, upon fairness, upon knowledge and on understanding, rather than evidence. It is a completely different way of doing things from our own. With this in mind then perhaps we can understand and see meekness in a lion, who sets aside its predatory nature and allows the majesty of a vulnerable child and a calf to live. We see the same in the bear with a cow and the leopard and kid, the wolf and the lamb. Is it too much of an ask to see mankind living peacefully with everything and everyone? Not in God's kingdom it seems, so as we pray Thy kingdom come, let's pray for meekness to come as well. For as St. Paul says of Jesus:

Christ's Example of Humility in Philippians chapter 2 verses 1 - 11

So, if there is any encouragement in Christ, any comfort from love, any participation in the Spirit, any affection and sympathy, complete my joy by being of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Therefore, God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Again, we could find ourselves thinking that as he is now exalted and given the name that is above every name, Jesus will appear as a more recognisable king. Wearing jewels and fine robes of state and ruling from a throne of gold. Yet, what does the glory of God look like? We read about a lamb in Revelation, a servant washing his friend's feet, a baby in a stable, a man on a cross, the fulfilment of law, in The New Testament the fulfilment and perfection of mercy and forgiveness. He hasn't changed his values or his standards of meekness, not weakness. Because meekness was his choice and with grace it can be ours.

Our lovely hymn reminds us who Jesus was and is, and who we should be - 272 STF

1] From heaven you came helpless babe, entered our world, your glory veiled, not to be served but to serve, and give your life that we might live.

This is our God, the servant king, he calls us now to follow him, to bring our lives as a daily offering, of worship to, the Servant King.
