Reflection

Jesus said: "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid." (John 14: 27)

What does the word "peace" mean to you? The absence of war for sure. We look out from the relative peace of our own land, summer riots notwithstanding, to a war-torn world and it is easy to see peace as the primary concern of others, those who negotiate, those who fight, those whose lives are ripped apart. But our reading from James brings it all firmly much nearer home. Read those verses again and see how James is pointing to individual selfishness as the source of the anger that can burst out and escalate. Earlier in the book of James we read "Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry." (1 v19) For me this is one of those verses in scripture which shout out and grab attention in a disturbing way. And I dare say I'm not alone. Why? Because many of us, myself included, are fond of the sound of our own voice, have opinions and on occasion are inclined to express them angrily. We might try to convince ourselves that we are expressing righteous anger and sometimes that may be so but, let's be honest, we are much more likely to be angered over things that affect us personally. Oh those petty irritations of life that

can lead us to sound off, often to those nearest and dearest; the politicians and celebrities who infuriate us; the car drivers we encounter who really should read their Highway code again! The list is potentially endless. And personal angers are sometimes magnified and spill over into warfare and riots, intolerance and racism. James's injunction to listen more than to speak and to be slow to speak, is profoundly counter-cultural in a world where self-expression, as opposed to self-control, and individuality, as opposed to collective responsibility, are lauded. Anger starts with individuals and we need to guard against that in our daily lives, because unchecked it may lead to fractious families, disputes with neighbours and, if unleashed more widely, societal breakdown. I wonder what you think Jesus meant when he said "my peace I leave with you" before he died – speaking to his friends who would be scattered, afraid, bereaved and persecuted? Spend a few minutes thinking about peace not so much as an absence of war, or noise, or chaos, but as the presence of God in the middle of all the things that trouble us. The Hebrew word for peace is "shalom" which carries a sense of wholeness and well-being in all areas of life. A sense of wholeness and completeness that comes from being a child of God, loved and precious, and held through the storms of life.

O God, the author of peace and lover of concord, to know you is eternal life and to serve you is perfect freedom: defend us, your humble servants, in all assaults of our enemies; that we, surely trusting in your defence, may not fear the power of any adversaries; through the might of Jesus Christ our Lord.
