The Lord's Prayer

Reading - John Chapter 6, verses 56 – 69 (NLT version)

Anyone who eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me, and I in him. I live because of the living Father who sent me; in the same way, anyone who feeds on me will live because of me. I am the true bread that came down from heaven. Anyone who eats this bread will not die as your ancestors did (even though they ate the manna) but will live forever.

He said these things while he was teaching in the synagogue in Capernaum.

Many of his disciples said, "This is very hard to understand. How can anyone accept it?"

Jesus was aware that his disciples were complaining, so he said to them. "Does this offend you? Then what will you think if you see the Son of Man ascent to heaven again? The Spirit alone gives eternal life. Human effort accomplishes nothing. And the very words I have spoken to you are Spirit and life. But some of you do not believe me."

At this point many of his disciples turned away and deserted him. Then Jesus turned to the Twelve and asked, "Are you also going to leave?"

Simon Peter replied, "Lord, to whom would we go? You have the words that give eternal life. We believe, and we know you are the Holy One of God."

Reflection

How many people do we know that had a Christian upbringing, learning about Jesus, going to Church and Sunday School, but lost their faith, for whatever reason. All we can do is pray for them and love them.

We can mention how much our faith has done for us, the hope, the love and purpose, but then we must let them decide.

After all, in the Gospel reading Jesus knew the pain of losing some disciples when doubts overtook their faith. Jesus wanted to explain to his disciples how faith in him nourishes our spiritual life, described himself as the bread of life, and promised that the one who eats this bread will live for ever. The disciples took this all too literally, and a fleshlier interpretation. 'We can't eat you, they protested, that would be cannibalism.' 'It is the Spirit that gives life, the flesh is useless', Jesus says.

Compare the reaction of some of those whom Jesus fed earlier in John 6. In the miracle of the feeding of the 5000, they received the sustenance of actual physical bread, so some think 'this is what we are looking for' and they come seeking Jesus for a free lunch. Their perspective is fixed on the here and now, they do not see the gift of that perishable bread as a sign point to something much, much more. Jesus is offering

them a different kind of bread, a bread that sustains beyond the physical and into the wonderful Spirit of Jesus. This bread is Jesus himself, the one who said, 'I am the bread of life'.

Left to our own devices, we can easily mislay our faith, not lose it, but we can lose focus and become weary and cynical, easily cast down. We settle for how it is. But Jesus invites us to believe in him, as the bread of life. When we extend our hands to receive bread at communion, we are saying 'Yes, we need you, more than our limiting worldly perspectives. We need Jesus in our lives.

Simon Peter understood this. When other disciples were leaving Jesus, finding his teaching too difficult, Jesus asked him, "Do you also wish to go away?" Peter answered, "Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God."

In other words, Jesus is the only one who can lead us deeper into God, deeper into all that we have yet to find and long to know. There is no one else who can take us on this journey. Only Jesus.

Faith is not a fleshly matter of feeling good when you pray, but a spiritual battle against doubt, and a will to get on with living a life of love for others; and this love is not slushy feelings, but a determination to be kind and compassionate to everyone.

Faith is not certainty; usually it consists of weighing up the probabilities and deciding that Jesus is the only way. If you have faith, give thanks, for it is God's gift. Try to be helpful to those who find faith difficult.

Jesus is the bread of life. There to be taken by anyone, anytime, anywhere.

We see Jesus as a doorway, where others only see a grave.

We all need Jesus. Amen
