In Good Voice



It's always fun to sneak into a choir rehearsal and just listen. The Choir at Fairplace, Okehampton were busy preparing for the Carols by Candlelight Service on December 21st at 4.00pm.

Under the able direction of Kath Brimacombe, the choir got to grips with new arrangements of old favourites and also some which were unfamiliar from a cantata by John W Peterson called "Love Transcending".

Where did Kath find this treasure trove? "I'm a bit of a squirrel", she chuckled, "I've been involved with choirs over many years and have built up quite a collection." Kath is clearly proud of Fairplace choir and rightly so.

The joy of singing and sharing the love of music draws in members from a wide area. One travels forty miles to attend. Bill from Belstone laughs in a typical Devon farmer's way, "It's better than cleaning out the cows!" At full strength the choir numbers thirty-six, which is impressive.

The altos blend to some lovely harmonies, and the overall effect is rich and warm.

Rachel, a soprano who is singing a solo "Mary's Child", grinned, saying "My cat knows this by heart." Clearly a lot of practice goes on outside the official rehearsal times too. All the soloists added feeling and character to the music. Jenny, who sings "Sleep Holy Child" with a beautiful tenderness was immersed in the moment.

The men get to shine too. "O Holy Night" which has been recorded by so many singers over the years has a different feel to it with this choir. An older male voice brings a gentle gravitas and builds to the familiar line "Fall on your knees, hear the angel voices"

It's less of a performance and more of a direct invitation to the hearer. The oldest member is Irving, who also has a solo part to sing. Amazing that in his 90s, his voice is strong and clear. He is also, like everyone else, having a grand old time.

Kath combines the strong direction that a choir needs to get to their best with a great sense of humour. Terms like "Boldly slushy" are easily understood and applied and smiling, they go over the piece again to give it more nuance.



"Joy to the world" is an absolute belter, using the arrangement written by the late and much loved Fairplace organist, John Holland. Kath, who knew him well called it a joint effort with her directing his music and for Ann who is singing with the altos it will be a fitting tribute to a very talented man.

So, if you are able, come along to the Candlelight Service 4pm on Sunday 21st and help raise the roof.



A big thanks goes to Michael Wadman our car park general who makes sure everyone parks properly and always greets them with a friendly face and conversation.

A huge thank you to Joan White, Paul and Catherine Purser for use of their yard and field to park in. Without it would be so difficult to operate safely.

Tich Scott, who mentions us to everyone he meets - and he meets a lot of people and is a great supporter of our chapel and project.

Also to other supporters such as Jim Causley, Bill Murray and especially to Steve Alford and Hayley Janze, and not forgetting to mention Tommy Jack who made his first visit to us today with his mum and dad.

I want to personally thank our Minister, the larger than life, Rev. Chris Jackson, who without his constant guidance and very clear support of what we are doing to keep Providence open; we would definitely not be in such a promising position.

A special thanks goes to Simon Timms, who had the vision to say no to a one-year exhibition and encouraged me to think bigger and longer term which means that our 5th consecutive year is a certainty and not a pipe dream.

Simon's involvement leads me to thank the Heritage Lottery fund and National Churches trust who have shown faith in our project from very different aspects, but have made all the difference when it mattered.

So here is to 2026 and our 5th year bringing people together at Providence for photographs, teas and conversation and a sense of community.


